The Vatican has accepted allegations that nuns suffer sexual abuse by priests, but says the problem is a limited one.

Vatican response

The official Vatican response said the Church was working to solve the problem and that it should not overshadow the good works done by members of the clergy.

"Some negative cases cannot let us forget the often heroic faith expressed by the large majority of those men and women in religious orders," the Vatican said.

A Benedictine abbot told the National Catholic Reporter he believes the Church is facing a serious problem.

"I think the abuse described is happening," said Father Nokter Wolf.

"How much it happens, what the numbers are, I have no way of knowing. But it is a serious matter, and we need to discuss it."
